I thought of something newsworthy. It has not been published in Daily News-Record yet. Here is the following excerpt from the V.A.D. Bulletin of the Virginia Association of the Deaf.

"From July 31st through August 8th, the VIIth World Congress of the World Federation of the Deaf will meet in Washington, D.C. at the Washington Hilton Hotel.

"This year's Congress will concern itself with the theme, 'Full Citizenship For All Deaf People,' and will represent the interests of approximately 35 million deaf and hard of hearing people throughout the world. The one-week program is expected to draw as many as 5,000 delegates from Africa, Asia, Europe, South America and the United States.

"The Congress will provide an international forum on a number of issues related to deafness; vocational, educational, cultural, spiritual, medical, psychological, technical, social, and communications."

Having toured a few European countries contacting the handicapped foreigners, our only daughter and her husband who are engaged in the field of education of the deaf attested that sign language of the deaf is of some help to communicate with the foreigners whose written and "spoken" languages are different.

The historical record of the Virginia Association of the Deaf in their bulletin reveals that "out of their own frustrating experiences they had learned that every available means of communication must be utilized in the education and socialization of the deaf."
